Drinks in school

Research has shown that children's brains work faster and are more efficient when they are properly hydrated. This is why children have a water bottle that they can sip from throughout the day.

The bottles are kept in an accessible place within the classroom and children can sip freely from them. They can also be refilled from our water cooler. However I would like to remind you that

children should have just water in their bottles. No flavoured water, or weak squash or any other kind of flavoured drink, it should just be water. During the lunchtime period children can drink whatever they wish-apart from fizzy drinks. Similarly, if you would like your child to have a small carton of milk at breaktime please see Mrs Mears in the office for an information leaflet and you can apply online at www.coolmilk.com.

The school is unable to order milk for your child on your behalf. Children under 5 receive their milk free of charge but you must still register and apply.
