It would be better to have daily homework than weekly. We ask the children to read every day if possible but daily homework would be unmanageable for many parents. However, children can always access Spelling Shed daily, as well as going over their mental maths facts.

It needs to cover a bit of all concepts but is usually limited to one of two subjects. It is right that reading, writing and maths should be the focus of most homework but we do set science, topic or research-based homework from time to time.

I wish we had more time to read with them. If you only have time for one type of homework, make it reading! My child reads independently every day.

We encourage our oldest to read on her own as she likes this better than reading out loud. Even capable readers should read aloud sometimes, as this enables adults to check that they are pronouncing words correctly and understanding trickier vocabulary. When they do read alone, it is a good idea to ask them to summarise what they have read...and please continue to write in their reading records! I'd like the books changed more regularly.

We'd like to have 3 books for the week. Until the children can change books themselves, there is quite a big time-commitment in changing books and taking 3 books each would increase the number of books we needed to buy. However, Oxford Owl has a wide range of colour-coded reading books online and these can be accessed as often as you like.

We find the reading a chore. It would be good if we could be trusted to read every day and then write comments of relevance only. Sadly, not all families are willing or able to read every day and writing in the reading record enables us to track which children may need a little extra support in school as a result.

We hope to have a computing and e-safety parent session before the end of the year where the various different online platforms and resources will be shared.

### How long does their homework take each week?

The most frequent answer was 20-30 minutes a week plus reading.

Some said as little as 10 minutes, some said over an hour.

### **Key findings:**

- Parents like the year group newsletters which now form part of the homework.
- Most parents are happy with the amount and type of homework. Reception parents prefer worksheets.
- Most children enjoy some or all homework and most parents enjoy supporting them with it.
- Most parents felt that the level of difficulty was about right.
- Most parents who responded said they read with their child most days.
- Over half of the families that responded used different online resources provided by the school at times.
